The impact of network cycles on employment and inequality

(joint with María Paz Espinosa and Jaromír Kovářik)

How do short network cycles—the building component of close-knit neighborhoods and the clustering coefficient—affect diffusion on networks? We explore this issue in labor markets by explicitly modeling the flow of information about vacancies in social networks. We show that short network cycles induce stochastic affiliation in the diffusion of job information, generating search frictions, with important microeconomic and macroeconomic consequences. Short network cycles affect inequality patterns within and across networked societies. In particular, they organize employment probabilities in the sense of the second-order stochastic dominance. *Ceteris paribus*, people in close-knit neighborhoods or dense networks exhibit worse and more unstable labor market outcomes. Since dense, overlapping neighborhoods is one aspect of strong relationships, we uncover a mechanism behind the strength of weak ties (Granovetter, 1973). Short network cycles induce further spacial and temporal correlations in employment status, shaping labor market transition rates and aggregate employment fluctuations.

Network perception in network games

People form cognitive maps about their networks from the information they have—mental representations of who is connected with whom in the network they are embedded in (Krackhardt, 1987). The aim of this paper is twofold. First, we explore the features of such cognitive maps in different setups of incomplete network information. We relate them with sociological notions of equivalence among nodes and identify a cognitive bias towards asymmetric network structures. We then explore the incidence that players’ network perception has on their equilibrium behavior and payoffs in the induced Bayesian Games. Manipulating information has largely non-monotonic effects on the structure and number of equilibria. However, the bias that players exhibit towards asymmetric network structures has influence both on their payoffs as well as on their equilibrium behavior.
